Morris Library Renovation Project Update

We are grateful for the assistance of David Carlson, Dean of Library Affairs at Morris Library, who has graciously agreed to provide for publication in this newsletter, ongoing information on the Library renovation.

News items relative to this will be published in as timely a manner as possible, by the newsletter staff.

The following is a listing of some of the renovation progress, as of 28 August 2006:

Morris Library Renovation Progress:

- Nearly all brick has been removed from the exterior.

- Exterior insulation and walls have been installed over approximately two-thirds of the building in preparation for exterior skin (brick on floors one through three, and metal siding on floors four through seven).

- Masonry work was scheduled to begin the week of September 4th. Brick will first begin to appear on the lower floor, northeast corner. A demo wall of brick has been constructed and approved.

- Excavation for the new expanded space (approximately 50,000 Gross Square Feet to the north) is complete; installation of the caissons was expected the week of August 28th; these will go down to bedrock for structural strength.

- The roofer arrived on site in late Au-

gust. Prep work for a new roof has begun on the seventh floor. Installation on the new roof, expected to begin mid-September, should be complete in early October. New roofs will then need to be installed on the third floor roofs.

- Installation and testing of the new fire sprinkler system is complete on floors six and seven, and is proceeding down through the lower floors.

- Some interior wall structures on upper floors (especially floor five) have been started.

This group of volunteers helped approximately 1700 students across all resident halls get their computers connected to the campus network. and web access. This makes them feel more at home and more connected to SIUC. If new incom-

ing Freshman can communicate with family and friends using the campus network it makes them feel less detached from their family unit. This type of thoughtful help can only help students and their families feel better about their college experience here at SIUC. So, thanks to all volunteers who helped with this project and maybe next year keep this project in mind of a way to help the students have a great experience here at SIUC.


Welcome from the SIUC Emeritus & Annuitant Association


